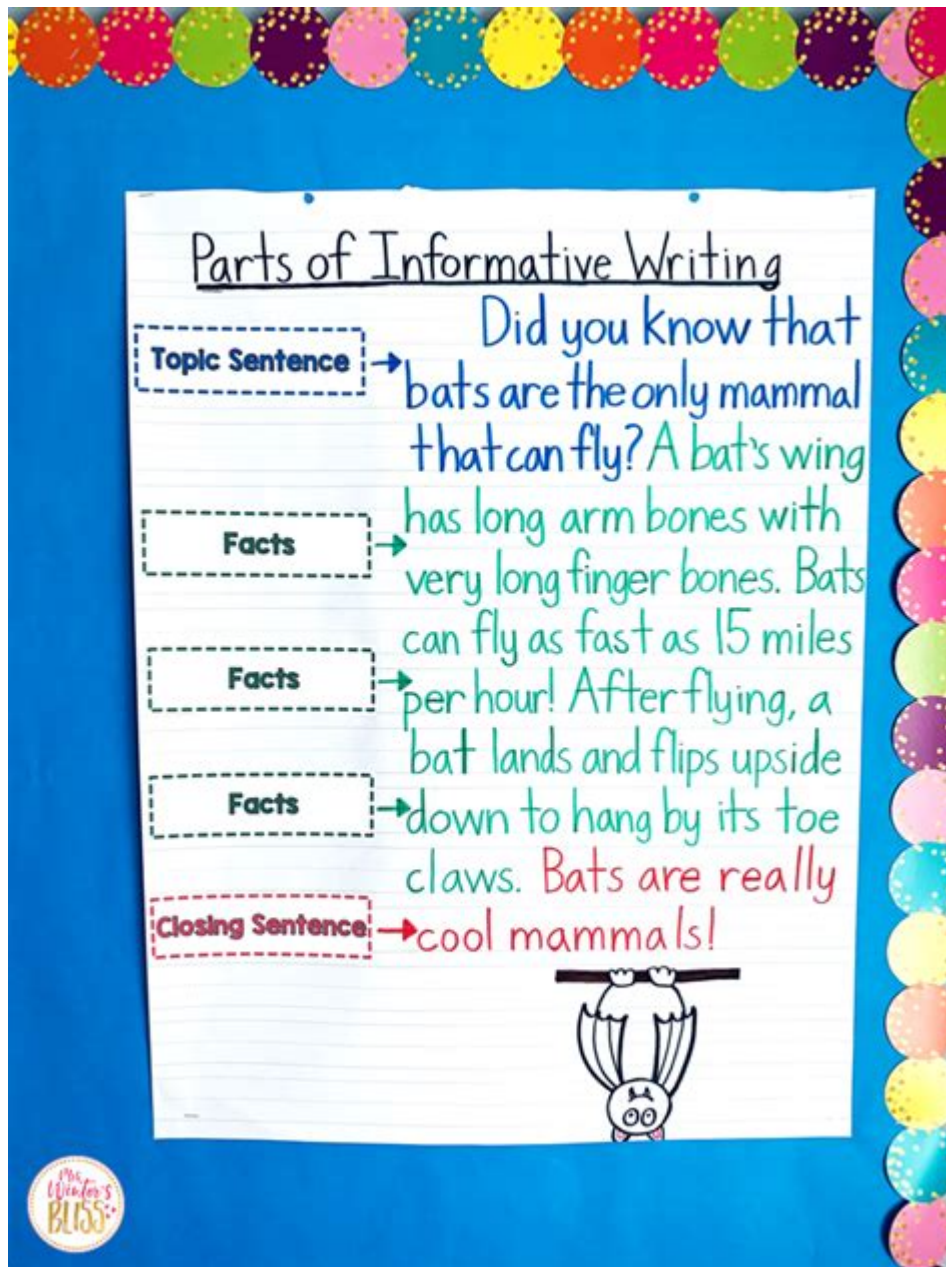


# 3rd Grade Informational Writing Samples
