Crossing the Delaware (2021)

The America's Beautiful National Parks Quarter Dollar Coin Act of 2008 specified what would happen when the program ended in 2021: "The reverse of the quarter dollar shall contain an image of General Washington crossing the Delaware River prior to the Battle of Trenton," and the obverse would "revert to the same design containing an image of President Washington" that was used before the State quarters program started in 1999.

American Women (2022-2025)

The Circulating Collectible Coin Redesign Act of 2020, signed into law January 13, 2021, brought wide-ranging changes involving all of America's circulating coins. In particular, it scheduled the quarter dollar as the venue for several new educational coin programs, including the American Women Quarters program.

From 2022 to 2025, the quarter commemorates prominent American women and the ratification of the Nineteenth Amendment granting women the right to vote. Five coins are being issued per year, each featuring a new reverse design honoring a woman selected from fields and accomplishments such as "suffrage, civil rights, abolition, government, humanities, science, space, and arts."
