Eudora Welty

Born in 1909 in Jackson, Mississippi, Eudora Welty began her working life as a publicity agent for the State Office of the Works Progress Administration (WPA) in 1933. She attended Mississippi State College for women from 1925 to 1927 and received her B.A. degree in 1929 from the University of Wisconsin. She also attended Columbia University.

One Writer's Beginnings (1984) is an autobiographical work that describes incidents in Welty's life that influenced her writing. She received the National Medal of Arts in 1986 and an award from the National Endowment for the Arts in 1989.

Known primarily as a short story writer and novelist, her first collection of stories, A Curtain of Green, was published in 1941. This was followed by The Wide Net (1943), The Golden Apples (1949), and The Bride of Innisfallen (1955). The title story of A Curtain of Green won the O. Henry Memorial Award.

Her novels include Delta Wedding (1946), The Ponder Heart (1954), Losing Battles (1970), and The Optimist's Daughter (1972), which won a Pulitzer Prize.

Though Welty's stories and novels are set in the South, they depict a wide spectrum of individuals, often portrayed humorously, who struggle to accommodate their lives and beliefs to a world that often seems puzzling and indifferent.
