First Continental Congress (1774):

- A convention (in Philadelphia) held with the purpose of determining how the colonies should react to what, from their viewpoint, seemed to pose an alarming threat to their rights and liberties.
- Was held as a colonial reaction to the Intolerable Acts.
- All the colonies (except Georgia) sent delegates to attend the convention.
- Colonists wanted to protest parliamentary intrusions on their rights and restore the relationship with the crown that had existed prior to the French and Indian War.

Patrick Henry:

- A radical delegate who represented Virginia at the First Continental Congress.
- Was a lawyer who was famous for his quote "Give me Liberty, or Give me Death!"

Samuel Adams:

- A radical delegate who represented Massachusetts at the First Continental Congress.
- Helped write the Massachusetts Circular Letter (1768); initiated the Committees of Correspondence (1772); was one of the major advocates of the Suffolk Resolves.

John Adams:

- A radical delegate who represented Massachusetts at the First Continental Congress.
- Published the pamphlet Thoughts on Government (1776), which was consequently influential in the writing of many state
- Was the 2nd president of the United States (1797-1801).

George Washington

- A Virginia delegate who had moderate views concerning the crisis imposed by Parliament.
- Considered the father of the American nation; was the 1st president of the U.S.; was a commander of a small militia during the French and Indian War, was leader of the American Continental Army during the American Revolution. John Dickinso
 - A moderate delegate who represented Pennsylvania in the First Continental Congress.
 - Was a lawyer who argued that the principle of no taxation without representation was an essential principle of English law......wrote "Letters From a Farmer in Pennsylvania" as a protest against taxation without representation

John Jay:

- Conservative delegate (favored a mild statement of protest) who represented New York at the First Continental Congress.
- Was elected president of the Continental Congress in 1778.

Joseph Galloway:

- A conservative delegate who represented Pennsylvania at the First Continental Congress.
- Proposed a plan that would have reordered relations with Parliament and formed a union of the colonies within the British Empire. By only one vote, this plan failed to pass.
- Even though he was involved in the First Continental Congress, he opposed the idea of colonial independence (so he remained a loyalist to Britain).

- Originally enacted in Massachusetts, it was one of the actions of the Continental Congress.
- This measure rejected the Intolerable Acts and called for their immediate repeal.
- It urged the various colonies to resist the Intolerable Acts by making military preparations and applying economic sanctions (boycott) against Great Britain.

Economic sanctions:

Economic penalties that can include tariffs/taxes, trade barriers, boycotts, etc.

Declaration of Rights and Grievances:

- A petition to the king urging him to redress (make right) colonial grievances and restore colonial rights.
 This document recognized Budies and restore colonial rights.
- This document recognized Parliament's authority to regulate commerce.

- A silversmith and patriot in the American Revolution.

 Was famous for his "Midnight Ride" on the night of April 18, 1775, in which he rode from Boston to Lexington to warm John Hancock and Samuel Adams of the movements of the British army.

William Dawes:

Was one of the three men who alerted colonial minutemen of the approach of British army troops prior to the Battle of Lexington and Concord at the outset of the American Revolution

Minutemen:

- A name given to teams of select men from the Massachusetts militia who had to be ready for battle in a minute's notice.
- These teams represented about a fourth of the entire militia, and generally were the younger and more mobile, serving part of network for early response to any threat.
