Raven and Sis. Catherine Miller.  In 1984, Sis Ellis gave up the post of President. Sis Miller also resigned as Secretary. An election was held and new officers were elected. Those new officers were: President — Bro. Lawrence Johnson, Vice-President — Sis. Lynne Bryant, Secretary — Sis. Matilda McCoy and Treasurer — Sis. Clara Ellis.  In 1986, Bro. Johnson resigned the President. On August 28, 1988, Bro. Norris Jackson resigned as the new President and Bro. Amos F. Jones was named as the new President. On September 11, 1988, Sis.
