The author makes no mention of their specific hopes for how the technology will turn out in the future, so choice B and choice E can be eliminated. The authors matter-of-fact tone allows you to rule out "fascination" (choice A), and there is no evidence to support whether or not the author has a smart phone (choice D). (Choice F is the best option)
