Japan takes Machuria - Answer defled open-door policy + League of nations, marched troops into Manchuria Sept. 1931, renamed the territory Manchukuo + established a puppet govt. League of Nations condemned Japan, Japan left League. League of Nations never taken seriously

Stimson Doctrine - Answer Secretary of State Henry Stimson declared in 1932, US would honor its 9-Power Treaty obligations by refusing to recognize any territorial [Manchukuo] that had been established by force. League of Nations adopted similar statement

fascism - Answer idea that people should glorify their nation + their race through aggressive use of force

Italian Fascist party - Answer Attracted dissatisfied war veterans, nationalist, and those afraid of rising communism. Marched on Rome and installed Mussolini in power.

Benito Mussolini - Answer leader of Italian Fascist party, (part of Axis powers)

Ethiopia - Answer 1935, Mussolini ordered Italian troops to invade Ethiopia, League of Nation + US objected but didn't stop it. Italian gained Ethiopia
