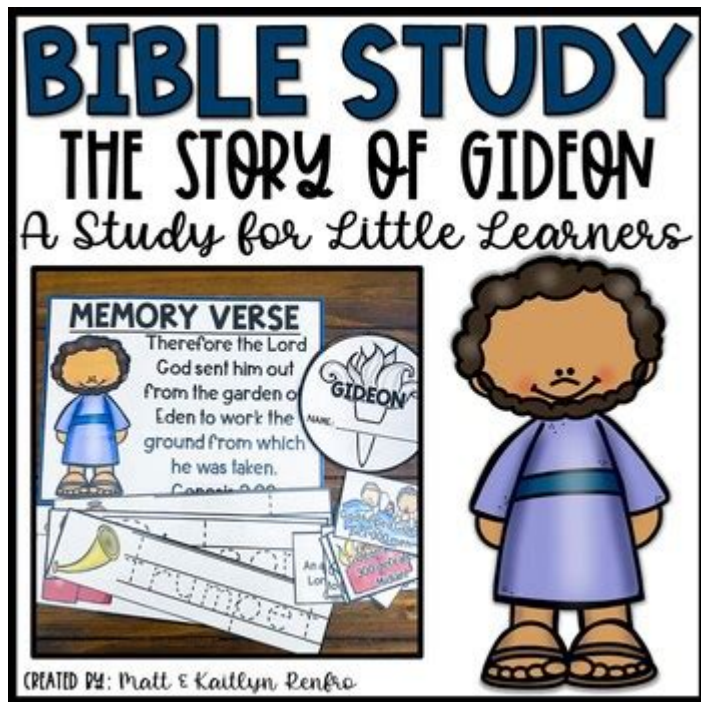


Bible Study On Gideon
