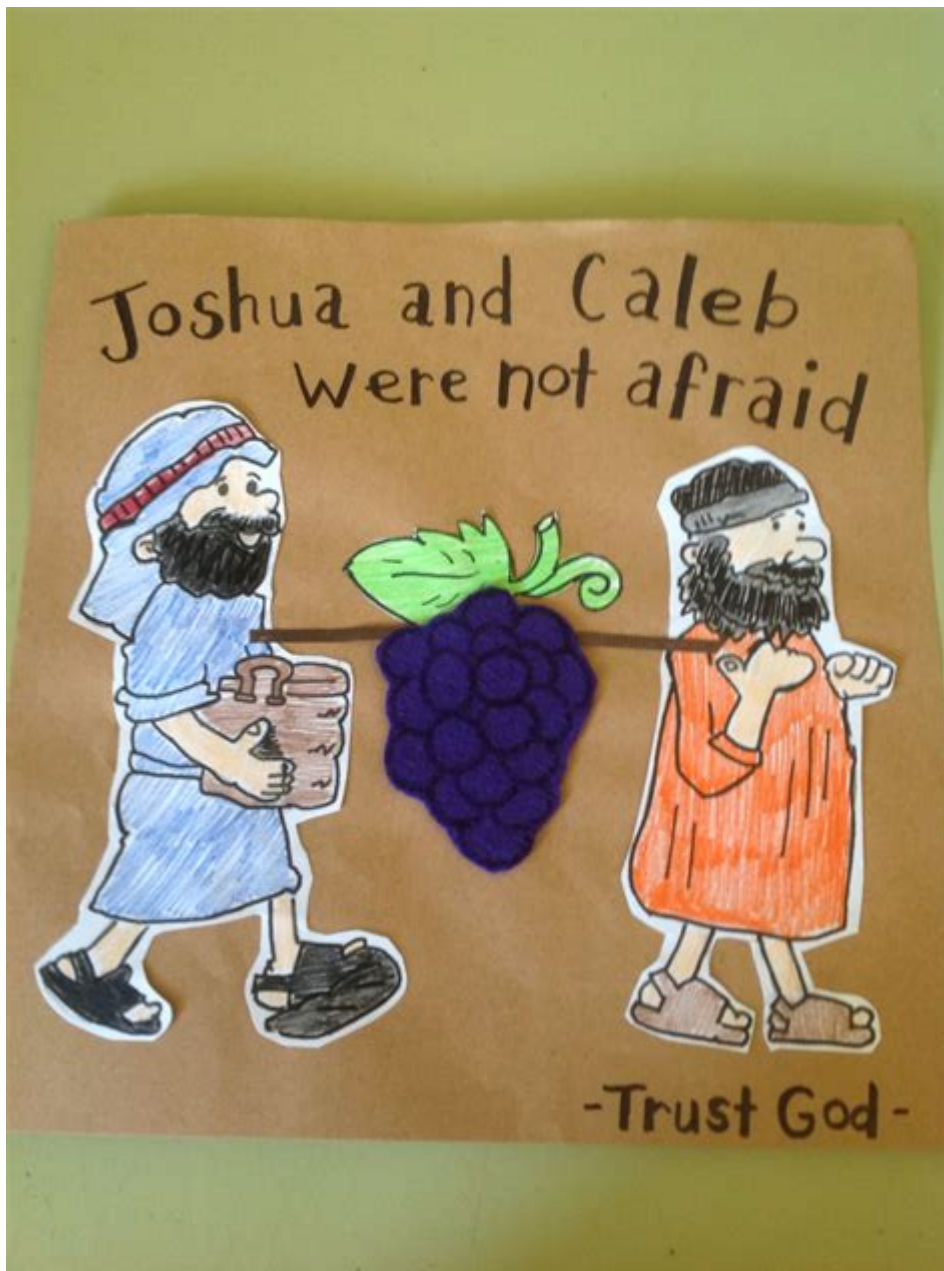


Bible Stories For Preschoolers With Crafts
