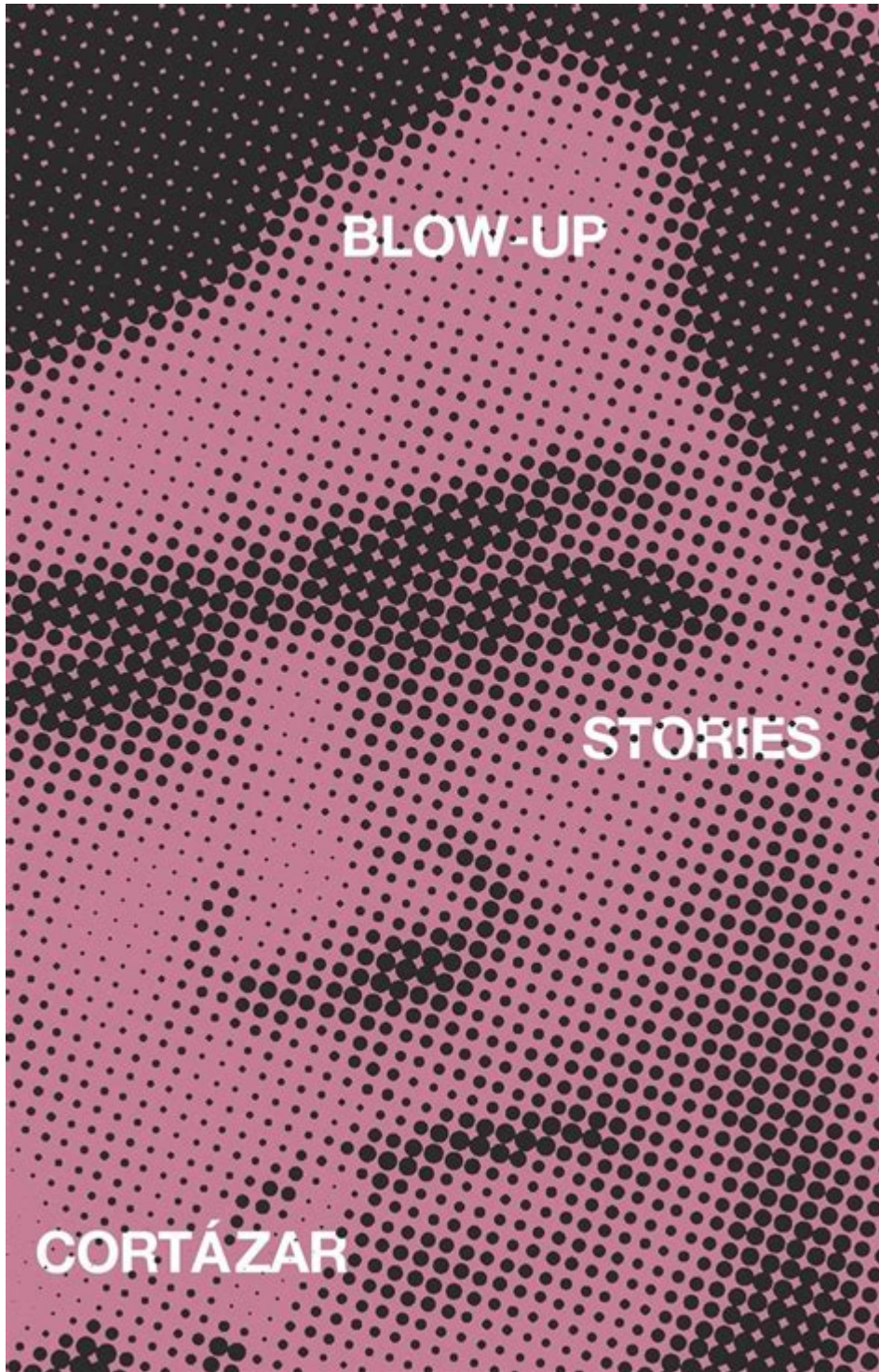


Blow Up By Julio Cortazar
