chapter 12 study guide

1. What is the difference between anabolism, catabolism and metabolism?

anabolism: synthesis of complex molecules from smaller, simpler ones → requires energy input as these reactions are energetically unfavourable → storing energy resources in energy-rich bonds of complex molecules usually through condensation

metabolism: the sum and interaction of all bio-chemical processes that occur within a living organism in order to maintain homeostasis, thus maintain life → catabolism and anabolism in interplay

catabolism: break down of complex molecules into smaller parts, energy becomes available as rich rich bonds are cleaved (mostly through using water → hydrolysis) thus energetically favourable → destructive metabolism

2. Be able to describe each of the four "stages" of the complete oxidation of glucose, if this occurs under aerobic or anaerobic conditions and where in the cell each occurs. Understand how the process of transferring electrons from glucose to O_2 results in ATP production.

1. glycolysis - cytoplasm, anaerobic (1x glucose 6C → 2x pyruvate 3C)
2. PDH (pyruvate decarboxylation) - mitochondrial matrix, aerobic (2x pyruvate 3C → 2x acetyl CoA 2C; production of 1 CO_2 per acetyl CoA + NADH)
3. Krebs cycle - mt matrix, aerobic (acetyl-CoA 2C + oxaloacetate 4C → citrate 6C → production of 2 CO_2 , 1 ATP, 3x NADH, 2x $FADH_2$ per round/per pyruvate)
4. oxidative phosphorylation (ETC and ATP-synthase) - inner mitochondrial membrane, aerobic → NADH and $FADH_2$ donate electrons to the ETC to generate proton motive force → towards mitochondrial matrix (through pumping)
