COLD WAR TIME LINE - DEFCON & WIN?

The DEFCON scale uses a minimum of 5 (for normal peacetime status) and a maximum of 1 (for situations of global severity, like nuclear war). The Cuban Missile Crisis was Level 2.

(A) Go through each of the events and assign your own DEFCON level. You may want to use a pencil as you might change your mind as you compare events. (A2) At the bottom of this sheet are phrases you may wish to add to your DEFCON level to help explain them.

(B) Who was the victor of that event? Soviets / USA / Draw / Lose-Lose / Win-Win
(B2) You may add nuance to the victor in some cases by having an alternate winner due to an alternative ideological or historical viewpoint.
