Anticipated Misunderstandings	Students may have difficulty with knowing the difference between fiction and nonfiction texts. We will discuss together what makes an informational book special. Students may also have difficulty with matching text features to their proper name. Visuals will be provided to help students be successful in learning the names of each feature. <i>(1a: Demonstrating Knowledge of Content and Pedagogy)</i>
