Bidding starts at 21 pts. (51 pts. if a double deck) and is an auction bid. If no one bids, the dealer has to take it at 20 pts. (50 pts. if it is a double deck).



Playing cards (aka tricks): you have to follow the suite being played with the next higher power card. If you don't have the suite you have to play a trump suite card. If some one else is trumping you have to play a higher trump card. If you don't have a trump suite card, then you can play any suite card.



Power of cards: Ace, Ten, King, Queen, Jack, and Nine. The person who played the highest card takes the trick.



Point cards: Ace, Ten, King (Nine when it is trump)

None point cards: Queen, Jack, Nine
