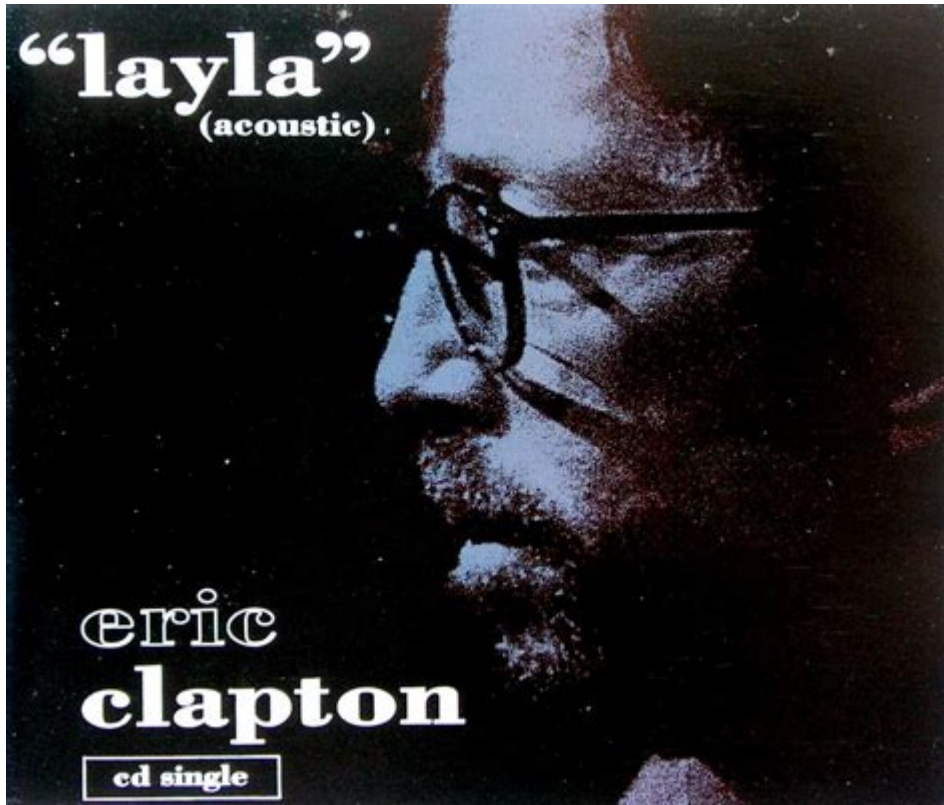


Eric Clapton Layla
