Example: The nurse observed that a depressed patient exhibited no obvious emotion

and reported that the patient had a flat affect

Occurring every year

Example: The patient told the nurse that she had scheduled her annual mammogram,

as she had been instructed

Apply

To place, put on, or spread something

Example: The physical therapist will apply a medication to the wound before covering

the wound with a bandage

Audible

Able to be heard

Example: The respiratory therapist noticed that when the patient was having a difficulty

breathing, the therapist could hear an audible wheezing sound

Bilateral

Present on two sides

Example: The unlicensed assistive personnel reported to the nurse that the patient had

bilateral weakness in the legs when walking
