Figurative Language



1. **Simile**- comparing two things using like or as. example: He is as cold as ice. (He is being compared to ice. He is mean.)
2. **Metaphor**- comparing two things without using like or as. example: Time is money. (Time is being compared to money.)
3. **Personification**- give objects or things human qualities. (SpongeBob SquarePants)
4. **Hyperbole**- an exaggerated claim not meant to be taken literally.
5. **Idioms**- a form of figurative language that cannot be taken literally. (figure of speech)
6. **Alliteration**- the use of repetitive beginning sounds.

- **ENGAGES READERS:** FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE MAKES STORIES AND POEMS MORE ENGAGING, HELPING CHILDREN CONNECT WITH THE MATERIAL ON A PERSONAL LEVEL.

TYPES OF FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE WORKSHEETS

- SENTENCES WITH MISSING WORDS WHERE CHILDREN MUST SELECT APPROPRIATE FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE TERMS TO COMPLETE THE SENTENCE.

- SHORT STORIES OR POEMS WITH BLANKS FOR STUDENTS TO FILL IN WITH SIMILES OR METAPHORS.

4. CREATIVE WRITING PROMPTS

- SHORT ANSWER QUESTIONS REQUIRING STUDENTS TO EXPLAIN THE MEANING OF A FIGURATIVE EXPRESSION.

TIPS FOR USING FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE WORKSHEETS EFFECTIVELY

TO MAXIMIZE THE BENEFITS OF FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE WORKSHEETS FOR KIDS, CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING TIPS:

1. START WITH THE BASICS

BEFORE DIVING INTO WORKSHEETS, ENSURE THAT CHILDREN HAVE A SOLID UNDERSTANDING OF WHAT FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE IS. INTRODUCE THEM TO THE DIFFERENT TYPES OF FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE, USING SIMPLE EXAMPLES THEY CAN RELATE TO. THIS FOUNDATIONAL KNOWLEDGE WILL MAKE THE WORKSHEETS MORE EFFECTIVE.

3. PROVIDE CONTEXT

WHEN USING WORKSHEETS, PROVIDE CONTEXT FOR THE FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE EXAMPLES. DISCUSS HOW THESE EXPRESSIONS ENHANCE THE MEANING OF THE TEXT AND ENCOURAGE CHILDREN TO THINK CRITICALLY ABOUT HOW AND WHY AUTHORS USE THEM.

4. ENCOURAGE COLLABORATION

GROUP ACTIVITIES CAN ENHANCE LEARNING EXPERIENCES. ENCOURAGE CHILDREN TO WORK TOGETHER ON WORKSHEETS, DISCUSSING THEIR THOUGHTS AND INTERPRETATIONS. THIS COLLABORATIVE APPROACH CAN LEAD TO DEEPER UNDERSTANDING AND ENJOYMENT OF FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE.

5. USE VARIED RESOURCES

TO KEEP CHILDREN ENGAGED, USE A VARIETY OF WORKSHEETS AND RESOURCES. DIFFERENT FORMATS AND ACTIVITIES WILL CATER TO VARIOUS LEARNING STYLES AND HELP MAINTAIN INTEREST. CONSIDER INTEGRATING ONLINE RESOURCES, INTERACTIVE GAMES, OR EVEN LITERATURE THAT FEATURES RICH FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE.
