The truth is that lawmaking takes a lot of time by design. A bill requires a **simple majority** (one more than half) in both houses before it can pass. That's 218 legislators in the House and 51 in the Senate, representing people with a diversity of ideas. So while you might think that a bill sounds like a good idea, that doesn't mean that everyone does.

Party politics affects the lawmaking process when the two main parties want a bill to tend to an issue in different ways. If Congress or the government is **divided**—meaning that the legislative branch or one house of Congress is controlled by one political party while the executive branch or other house is controlled by another—actually passing a bill can be especially difficult when parties can't find common ground or agree. For some Americans, this type of congressional “gridlock” is positive. It ensures that decision-making is careful, thoughtful, and well-supported.
