Figurative Language

Onomatopoeia	Words associated with sounds of objects or actions. Ex: The car <u>zoomed</u> by.
Alliteration	When two or more words have the same beginning sound. Ex: The <u>gale</u> got kept still all night.
Personification	Giving human qualities to a non-human object. Ex: <u>The lightning danced</u> across the sky.
