KEY EVENTS OF THE JEFFERSONIAN ERA

THE LOUISIANA PURCHASE (1803)

THE LOUISIANA PURCHASE WAS A MONUMENTAL LAND ACQUISITION THAT DOUBLED THE SIZE OF THE UNITED STATES. JEFFERSON'S DECISION TO PURCHASE THE TERRITORY FROM FRANCE WAS CONTROVERSIAL, AS IT RAISED QUESTIONS ABOUT THE CONSTITUTIONAL AUTHORITY OF THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. THE LEWIS AND CLARK EXPEDITION (1804-1806)

COMMISSIONED BY JEFFERSON, THE LEWIS AND CLARK EXPEDITION AIMED TO EXPLORE THE NEWLY ACQUIRED TERRITORY AND FIND A PRACTICAL ROUTE TO THE PACIFIC OCEAN. THE EXPEDITION PROVIDED VALUABLE INFORMATION ABOUT THE GEOGRAPHY, RESOURCES, AND INHABITANTS OF THE WEST, PAVING THE WAY FOR WESTWARD EXPANSION.

THE EMBARGO ACT OF 1807

IN RESPONSE TO BRITISH AND FRENCH INTERFERENCE WITH AMERICAN SHIPPING, JEFFERSON ENACTED THE EMBARGO ACT OF 1807, WHICH PROHIBITED AMERICAN SHIPS FROM TRADING WITH FOREIGN NATIONS. THE ACT AIMED TO PROTECT AMERICAN INTERESTS BUT ULTIMATELY HARMED THE U.S. ECONOMY AND LED TO WIDESPREAD DISCONTENT.

THE WAR OF 1812 (1812-1815)

THE WAR OF 1812 WAS A CONFLICT BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES AND GREAT BRITAIN, DRIVEN BY ISSUES SUCH AS TRADE RESTRICTIONS, IMPRESSMENT OF AMERICAN SAILORS, AND BRITISH SUPPORT FOR NATIVE AMERICAN RESISTANCE AGAINST AMERICAN EXPANSION.
