Whatever we were to each other, that we are still.

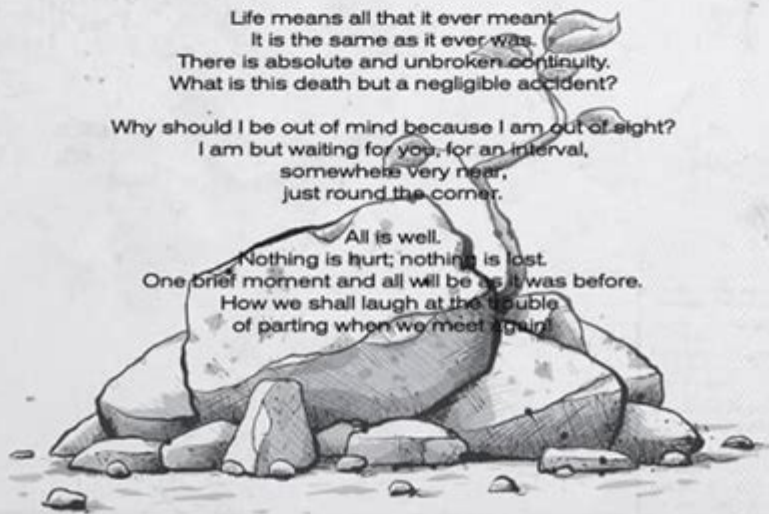
Call me by the old familiar name.
