Corrie would eventually be led away to prison, to Vught Concentration Camp, and finally to Ravensbruck Concentration Camp. After the war, she would be led into a ministry of reconciliation that would require her to forgive the Nazis who had tried to destroy her.
 - Regarding Father's train case, Casper said: *"It is the same way, Corrie, with knowledge. Some knowledge is too heavy for children when you are older and stronger you can bear it. For now you must trust me to carry it for you."*
If Corrie had known from the beginning of the Nazi occupation of Holland all that lay ahead of her, she would not have been able to bear it. Each trial she experienced made her older and stronger in her faith in Christ, ready to carry more than she could have before.
