Four Vital Writing Skills

As you write, focus on these four writing techniques. Practice them. Master them. They are straightforward but powerful tools that will transform your writing.

Start with Structure

Well-organized structure makes it much easier to write paragraphs and sentences. So, build that structure first:

- **Brainstorm** each topic you want to discuss. Aim broader than specific facts but narrower than multi-point arguments.
- **Organize** your topics. Cluster them in different sections. Arrange them in order of importance, step-by-step, or from simple to complex.
- **Fill** each topic with content. Paste any relevant notes, citations, or data. Don't worry about organizing it, yet--that comes later.

Make One Point

Troubleshoot each paragraph by considering the following questions:

- Does it have one main point? (Can you explain it without using the word "and"?)
- If it makes multiple points, can you split it up into more than one paragraph?
- Does the paragraph's main point elaborate the main point of the sub-section it sits in?
- If not, should you reword it, delete it, or move it to a more appropriate sub-section?

Use a similar framework to troubleshoot sentences and sub-sections.

Focus on Paragraphs

Paragraphs--not sentences--are the most important part of your writing. So, stop agonizing over sentences. Focus on writing good paragraphs:

- Start each paragraph with a topic sentence that explains its main point.
- Add more sentences to give details, caveats, and explanations that enrich that topic sentence.
- Organize the sentences from least-to-most complex, step-by-step, or most-to-least important.

Write and Edit Separately

Writing and editing are two very different skills. You must separate them or your work will suffer.

Write, don't Edit:

- Write to get words onto paper.
- Write so fast that your editing brain won't be able to keep up.

Edit, don't Write:

- Edit to make your writing more readable.
- Edit on physical paper with a red pen. This slows things down, which inhibits writing.
