- War depicted as a corrective for materialism, individualism and political division
- War depicted as a biological necessity for the survival of the species and the progress of civilization
- Military and the state
  - Influence of military officers on government policy
  - Mass production of armaments and conscription, an increase in military spending 1870 – 1914
  - War plans based on rapid mobilization and logistical time tables which imposed constraints on diplomats during the July crisis

How is imperialism a cause of WWI?

Imperialism brings countries into direct conflict with each other over resources or cultural influence. These conflicts are then amplified by forces such as racial nationalism, nationalism, and militarism.
