Background Information: President John Adams, a Federalist was defeated by Thomas Jefferson, a Democrat-Republican in the election of 1800. The night before Adams left office, he appointed a number of judges. These judges were nicknamed the "midnight judges". William Marbury was one of the "midnight judges". When Jefferson became president, his Secretary of State James Madison, who was in charge of giving the judges their commissions refused to give one to Marbury. Marbury sued Madison and this court case became one of the most important Supreme Court rulings in U.S. history. John Marshall, the Supreme Court Chief Justice, delivered the ruling against Marbury. Marshall wrote that although Marbury did have a right to his commission, the Supreme Court did not have the power to order the commission despite the Judiciary Act of 1789. He wrote that the Judiciary Act of 1789 was unconstitutional. In his ruling he set the important precedent of judicial review. Judicial review is the power of the Supreme Court to declare a law unconstitutional. This decision increased the power of the Supreme Court as well as the federal government. It also reaffirmed that the Constitution is the supreme law of the land.	
Chief Justice Marshall delivered the opinion of the Court: It is emphatically the province and duty of the judicial department to say what the law is. It is also not entirely unworthy of observation that in deciding what shall be the supreme law of the land, the constitution itself is first mentioned, and not the laws of the United States generally, but those only which shall be made in pursuance of the constitution, have that rank. Thus, the particular phraseology of the constitution of the United States confirms and strengthens the principle, supposed to be essential to all written constitutions, that a law repugnant to the constitution is void, and that courts, as well as other departments, are bound by that instrument. The rule must be discharged.
