This dark beltline was the trail—the main trail—that led south two hundred miles to the Chukot Pass, then, and well west, and then led north seventy miles to Denman, and still on to the north a thousand miles to Nulato, and finally to St. Michael on Bering Sea, a thousand miles and half a thousand more.

But all this—the enormous, far-reaching beltline trail, the absence of sun from the sky, the tremendous cold, and the enormous and untold of it all—made no impression on the men. It was not because he was long used to it. He was a new comer to the land, a chukchee, and this was his first winter. The trouble with him was that he was without imagination. He was quick and alert in the things of life, but only in the things, and not in the night-dreams. Fifty degrees below zero meant eighty odd degrees of frost. Such fact impressed him as being cold and uncomfortable, and that was all. Fifty degrees below zero would be a lot of frost that hurt and that must be guarded against by the use of clothes, wet-fogs, warm mittens, and thick socks. Fifty degrees below zero was to him just precisely fifty degrees below zero. What there should be anything more to it than that was a thought that never entered his head.
