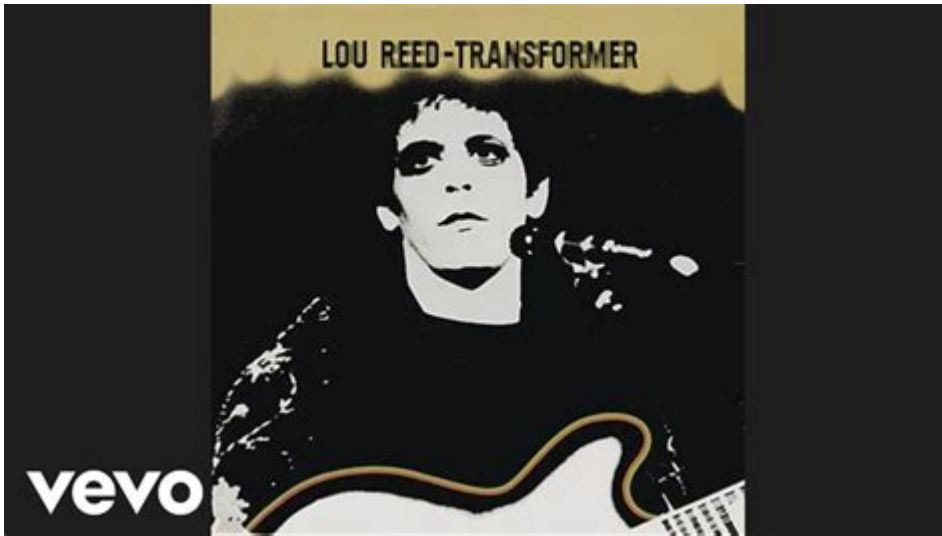


Lou Reed Walk On The Wild Side
