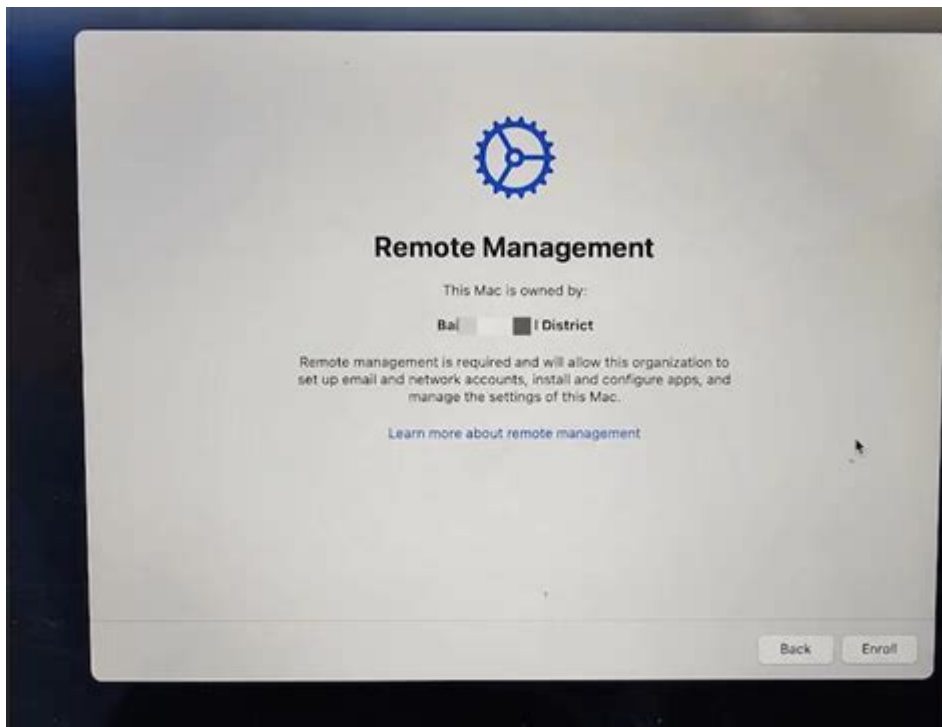


# Mac Stuck On Remote Management Screen
