LSAT Logical Reasoning sample questions

Question 1

Laird: Pure research provides us with new technologies that contribute to saving lives. Even more worthwhile than this, however, is its role in expanding our knowledge and providing new, unexplored ideas.

Kim: Your priorities are mistaken. Saving lives is what counts most of all. Without pure research, medicine would not be as advanced as it is.

Laird and Kim disagree on whether pure research

- A. derives its significance in part from its providing new technologies
- B. expands the boundaries of our knowledge of medicine
- C. should have the saving of human lives as an important goal
- D. has its most valuable achievements in medical applications
- E. has any value apart from its role in providing new technologies to save lives

Explanation for Question 1

This question asks you to identify the point at which Laird and Kim disagree with respect to pure research. Laird discusses two contributions to pure research: the medical applications (the saving of lives) and the role in expanding knowledge and providing new, unexplored ideas. Kim, in contrast, does not agree to contribute to its knowledge of life. Kim, in the other hand, maintains that "the saving of lives counts most of all." Since Kim's research seems to be through medical applications, Kim disagrees with Laird's view of pure research. Kim is most likely to believe that the medical applications are the most important contribution to pure research.

Response (A) is incorrect since we can determine, based on their statements, that Laird and Kim agree that pure research "derives its significance in part from its providing new technologies." Laird explicitly states the value of pure research with respect to providing new technologies. Kim indirectly agrees with (A), as noted in the same of medical applications, by stating that "the saving of lives counts most of all."

Response (B) is incorrect since we can determine, based on their statements, that Laird and Kim agree that pure research "expands the boundaries of our knowledge of medicine." Laird notes that pure research provides us with new technologies that have medical applications. Kim goes so far as to state "Without pure research, medicine would not be as advanced as it is."

Response (C) is incorrect. Kim is clearly against the idea that pure research "should have the saving of human lives as an important goal" since Kim's position is that "the saving of lives counts most of all." Kim is not in the wrong to believe as many would that pure research is worthwhile in itself. Laird is in fact in agreement with Kim's position. Laird is in the wrong to believe that pure research should have the saving of human lives as an important goal, although Laird believes that expanding knowledge and providing new ideas could be an even more important goal to pure research. The same could be determined from the fact that Kim is not.

Response (E) is incorrect. Laird clearly agrees that pure research has other contributions to life in addition to its medical applications. Laird states that "the saving of lives counts most of all." Kim's position is that "the saving of lives counts most of all." Kim is not in the wrong to believe as many would that pure research is worthwhile in itself. Laird is in fact in agreement with Kim's position. Laird is in the wrong to believe that pure research should have the saving of human lives as an important goal, although Laird believes that expanding knowledge and providing new ideas could be an even more important goal to pure research. The same could be determined from the fact that Kim is not.

This question was of medium difficulty, based on the number of test takers who answered it correctly and it appeared on the LSAT.
