Design Texture - Answer -Wave patterns that must be taken into consideration when designing a style.

Diagonal Back - Answer -A type of diagonal line that creates movement AWAY from the face.

Diagonal Forward - Answer -A type of diagonal line that creates movement TOWARD the face.
