 - For the gods and goddesses—only know the roles of those in *The Odyssey*: Zeus, Poseidon, Athena, Hermes
 - As for the definition of the epic and epic hero
 - Pre-reading notes
 - Definition of an epic, an epic hero, epic conventions, biographical notes on Homer, the nature of the Greek gods
- **Reading**—The best way to prepare overall is to review the reading questions to recall key moments and characters from the story. My goal is for you to know the stories well enough that you would be able recall and retell it satisfactorily later on. That means that you don't have to know all the tiny details but that you should know the ones that are central to the narrative. (There may be one or two detail-y multiple choice questions—in order to challenge the most attentive readers.)
