ALGEBRA I (COMMON CORE) STUDY SHEET

LINEAR EQUATIONS

• Defined by: **constant** rate of change AKA **slope**

Slope-Intercept Form: $y = mx + b$

slope \swarrow y -intercept \searrow

Point-Slope Form: $y - y_1 = m(x - x_1)$

Slope Between 2 Points:

$$m = \frac{\Delta y}{\Delta x} = \frac{y_2 - y_1}{x_2 - x_1}$$

TYPES OF SLOPE

Positive	Negative	Zero	Undefined
+	-	0	∞

Parallel Slopes: $m_1 = m$ VS. Perpendicular Slopes: $m_1 = -\frac{1}{m}$

LINEAR INEQUALITIES

$y > mx + b$	$y < mx + b$	$y \geq mx + b$	$y \leq mx + b$

QUADRATIC EQUATIONS

PARABOLAS

Standard Form: $y = ax^2 + bx + c$

Vertex Form: $y = a(x - h)^2 + k$

Same Sign \swarrow Opposite Sign \searrow

Vertex is at: (h, k)

• " a " tells if parabola opens up or down

a is Positive

Vertex is a minimum (h, k)

a is Negative

Vertex is a maximum (h, k)

3 Methods to "Solve" Quadratic Equations:

• "Solutions" AKA: "roots", "zeros", or x -intercepts

- Factoring** (easiest method when possible)
 - $0 = (x - m)(x - n) \Leftrightarrow x = m \quad \& \quad x = n$
 - if solving an equation in the form: $0 = x^2 + bx + c$ find 'm' and 'n' such that: $m \cdot n = c \quad \& \quad m + n = b$
 - remember difference of squares: $x^2 - m^2 = (x + m)(x - m)$
- Completing the Square**

$$x^2 + bx + c = 0 \Leftrightarrow (x + \frac{b}{2})^2 = c + (\frac{b}{2})^2$$
- Quadratic Formula**

$$x = \frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^2 - 4ac}}{2a}$$

Axis of Symmetry $x = -\frac{b}{2a}$ Discriminant

1	$b^2 - 4ac > 0$	2 Real Solutions
2	$b^2 - 4ac = 0$	1 Real Solution
3	$b^2 - 4ac < 0$	No Real Solutions

TYPES OF NUMBER

- Natural #'s:** $\{1, 2, 3, \dots\}$
- Whole #'s:** $\{0, 1, 2, 3, \dots\}$
- Integers:** $\{\dots, -3, -2, -1, 0, 1, 2, 3, \dots\}$
- Rational #'s:** Ratio of any 2 integers 'a' and 'b' (in the form: $\frac{a}{b}$)
- Irrational #'s:** Not rational... "weird" #'s like: $\pi, \sqrt{2}, -\sqrt{6}, e$
- Real #'s:** The set of all Rationals & Irrationals
