

Writing Cheat Sheet Digital SAT®	
Always read from the beginning of a sentence <u>all the way to the period</u>	Colon = Period when sentence #2 explains or defines sentence #1
Transitions: continue, cause-and-effect, or contradict? Determine category, then check answers	Colon = explanation or list; follows a sentence; followed by sentence or fragment
"Student" Notes: ID key word(s) in question & find answer that matches; avoid bullet points	It, Its = Sing. Noun They, Their, Them = Pl. Noun
2 commas = 2 dashes = 2 parentheses	Singular <u>verbs</u> end in -s; plural verbs do not
Period = Semicolon = Comma + and/but	2 consecutive nouns usually = apostrophe-no apostrophe (1st noun poss., 2nd noun pl.)
