## School Librarian Interview Questions

- What do you enjoy reading? About how much do you read each week or month?
  - I love historical fiction. I don't get to read as much as I would like unless it is over a break.
- What is your experience in leading professional development? What is your role in leading technology related professional development?
  - I do not lead professional developments. I send out information whenever I can as well as talk to teachers one-on-one about new things or ideas. I have no role in leading technology related professional development. We have instructional technology staff that is in charge of that.
