Simple, Compound, Complex Sentences

Simple Sentence - A simple sentence contains a subject and a verb. You also need to use a capital letter and a full stop, e.g. The flower grew. Compound Sentence - Joins 2 simple sentences, both sentences make sense when you read them on their own. The sentences can be joined using the word 'and, 'but', 'so', 'for', 'yet' E.g. I went to the park and I played on the slide. Maya played on the slide, so Amy went on a swing. Complex Sentence - Has a main clause that makes sense on its own and a sub-ordinate clause, that doesn't make sense on its own. The sub-ordinate clause adds more detail to the main clause. It can be at the beginning, middle or end of the sentence. E.g Having worked all day, Maya went to the park to play on a slide. The bookcase, which was made of wood, burnt quickly in the fire.
