- **Conceptual Foundations**

- **Sociological Imagination – C.W. Mills:** The ability to connect the most basic, intimate aspects of a individual's life to seemingly impersonal and remote historical force
 - Raised questions about the concentration of power in elite hands during post-World War II United States
 - The task of sociology was seen as connecting history and biography
 - Tracing the connection between "personal troubles" and wider "public issues"
 - "Individual Freedoms": Bodily Norms, Language, Education, Social Class, Name
- **"Instinctual Deficiency":**
 - Arnold Gehlen – humans are instinctively deficient
 - Human life is institutionally and culturally regulated (a biological or physiological explanation of human behavior is not sufficient)
- **Holism:** The whole is greater than the sum of the parts
 - Emergent Properties: Collectivities exhibit characteristics that cannot be found in their constituent parts
- **Positivism:** The belief that the social world can be described and predicted by certain observable relationships
 - Founder: Auguste Comte
 - Arose out of a need to make moral sense of the social order in time of declining religious authority
 - Goal: To identify valid generalizations about human interaction, culture, and institutions
- **Durkheim's Suicide:** Suicide rates vary amongst groups, religions, and societies
 - Positivism
 - Factors: Religion, Family Structure, Political Events, Hardships
 - High Solidarity = Lower Suicide Rates
 - Suicide is conditioned by social factors
- **Niccolò Beisel & Anti-Vice Campaigns:** Late 19th Century
 - Anti-Vice Campaigns stamp out obscenity, gambling, alcohol, and prostitution very powerfully in Boston & New York
 - Immigrant populations in Boston & New York had become threats to the local dominant upper classes; elite classes had never been threatened and had never had to resort to such moral campaigns
 - A function of political and social pressure on the elite
- **Functionalism:** Various social institutions and processes exist in society to serve some important or necessary function to keep society running
- **Conflict Theory – Karl Marx:** A theory that states society is in a position of perpetual conflict because of competition for limited resources; social order is maintained
