- Symptoms include: trouble sleeping, sleeping too much, irritability, isolation, loss of appetite, weight gain, tearfulness, loss of interest in activities, headaches, body aches, suicidal ideations, lack of ability to concentrate, feelings of hopelessness and despair.
- The person's symptoms are a cause distress or difficulty in functioning at home, work, or other important areas (social, occupational, recreational).
- The person's symptoms are not caused by substance use (e.g., alcohol, drugs, medication) or a medical disorder.

Bipolar Disorder -

- 1. Formerly referred to as "Manic Depression",
- Bipolar is similar to depression but is characterized by the presence of manic episodes in addition to depression.
