### Human Development Theories

#### 1. Maturationist

Maturationism is an early childhood educational philosophy that sees the child as a growing organism and believes that the role of education is to passively support this growth rather than actively fill the child with information. This theory suggests that growth and development unfold from within the organism. Biological cycles of development are divided into six well-defined stages which are repeated throughout life. One cycle includes the following stages: Growth, Break-Up, Sorting Out, Inwardizing, Expansion, and Neurotic "Fitting Together".

#### 2. Constructivist

Learners make sense of new information through problem solving, working together, and applying information to real-life situations. They construct their own understanding.

Piaget proposed four major stages of cognitive development. Each stage is correlated with an approximate age period of childhood:

0-2 → Sensorimotor: learning with the senses

2-7 → Preoperational: symbolic thinking

7-12 → Concrete operational: logical concrete reasoning

12 and up → Formal operational: systematic thinking, theory development, abstract thinking

Along with the stages of development, Piaget's theory has several other main concepts:

- Schemas are thought processes that are essentially building blocks of knowledge. A baby, for example, knows that it must make a sucking motion to eat. That's a schema.
- Assimilation is how you use your existing schemas to interpret a new situation or object. For example, a child seeing a skunk for the first time might call it a cat.
- Accommodation is what happens when you change a schema, or create a new one, to fit new information you learn. The child accommodates when they understand that not all furry, four-legged creatures are cats.
- Equilibrium happens when you're able to use assimilation to fit in most of the new information you learn. So you're not constantly adding new schemas.
