314-342-8206**ST. LOUIS** • AT&T plans to move employees out of One AT&T Center by 2015, a decision that threatens to leave one of the biggest office buildings in downtown St. Louis mostly vacant. The telecommunications giant said Thursday that it is shifting workers — an estimated 2,000 in all — out of the 44-story tower on Chestnut Street into other buildings downtown and in west St. Louis County. The company said it needs less office space as more employees work from home. Its total employment has shrunk in the St. Louis area in recent years as well.

No one will lose a job as part of the reorganization, a company spokeswoman said.

With about 4,000 employees, as of 2012, in three buildings in a row along Chestnut and Pine streets, AT&T is the biggest employer in the city's central business district. Its badge-wearing workers are a common sight in the sandwich shops near the Old Post Office and Citygarden across the street.

But the population of those towers has been dwindling in recent years, a result of cuts at AT&T's Yellow Pages division — which it sold off as a separate unit.

WON'T GIVE UP FIGHT

Rep. Hubbard changed votes on key issues after son was hired as lobbyist.

573-556-6181**JEFFERSON CITY** • Rep. Penny Hubbard, a Democrat from St. Louis, proved to be a key swing vote for two issues Wednesday.

She had initially voted against a bill limiting lawsuits against the Doe Run Co. But on Wednesday, Hubbard joined the Republican majority in overriding Gov. Jay Nixon's veto of the bill.

One day earlier, her son, Rodney Hubbard, had gotten a lobbying job with Doe Run, according to Missouri Ethics Commission records.

Penny Hubbard also changed her position on a bill limiting lawsuits by uninsured motorists. She gave that override the minimum number of votes needed to pass.

The Missouri Insurance Coalition, which led that drive, also had hired Rodney Hubbard as a lobbyist, on Aug. 21.

Rodney Hubbard insisted Thursday that he had nothing to do with his mother's votes. "I don't even know she

573-556-6186**JEFFERSON CITY** • Legislation that would have cut income taxes in Missouri for the first time in nearly a century is dead, but many supporters say they aren't giving up.

A day after the Missouri House fell 15 votes shy of overriding Gov. Jay Nixon's veto, legislative leaders vowed that cutting taxes will be the top priority for the Legislature when it returns to the Capitol in January.

And representatives of an effort largely financed by retired investor Rex Sinquefeld of St. Louis said they will continue to forge ahead with promoting income tax cut proposals.

"There's been an overwhelming response and groundswell, and we have the public's focus," said Aaron Wilk, treasurer for the Grow Missouri coalition. "Going forward, we have a very good idea of something that could be put in another proposal."

But just as he was this year, Nixon, a Democrat, could prove to be the biggest hurdle for Republicans moving ahead.

Armed with supermajorities in the House and Senate, GOP

Lincoln's clothes hung loosely from his frail frame, and relatives who haven't seen him for much of his 30 years served reminded on how "little" and "cute" he looked, at 69. For about an hour as lawyers argued, Lincoln sat unshackled in a chair, soaking up the indulgence — however fleeting.

Behind him to his left sat one of the victims. It

The documents Twitter filed with the Securities and Exchange Commission are sealed, as Twitter is taking advantage of federal legislation passed last year that allows companies with less than \$1 billion in revenue in its last fiscal year to avoid submitting public IPO documents.

The confidentiality will likely help Twitter, co-founded by St.
