- Point of view:** the point of view the story is told from  
**1<sup>st</sup> person:** main character uses "I," "me," "my"  
**2<sup>nd</sup> person:** main character is referred to as "thou" or "thee" or "you"  
**3<sup>rd</sup> person limited:** audience knows the thoughts and feelings of one character  
**3<sup>rd</sup> person omniscient:** audience knows the thoughts and feelings of multiple characters  
**Situational irony:** the unexpected happening (usually negative)  
**Motivation:** the reason for a character's actions  
**Dynamic character:** a character that changes (internally or in a significant way)  
**Static character:** a character that does not change  
**Flat character:** a character that is one-dimensional  
**Round character:** a complex character that has both virtues and flaws  
**Imagery:** when an author appeals to the five senses  
**External Conflict:** when something outside the main character comes against him/her
