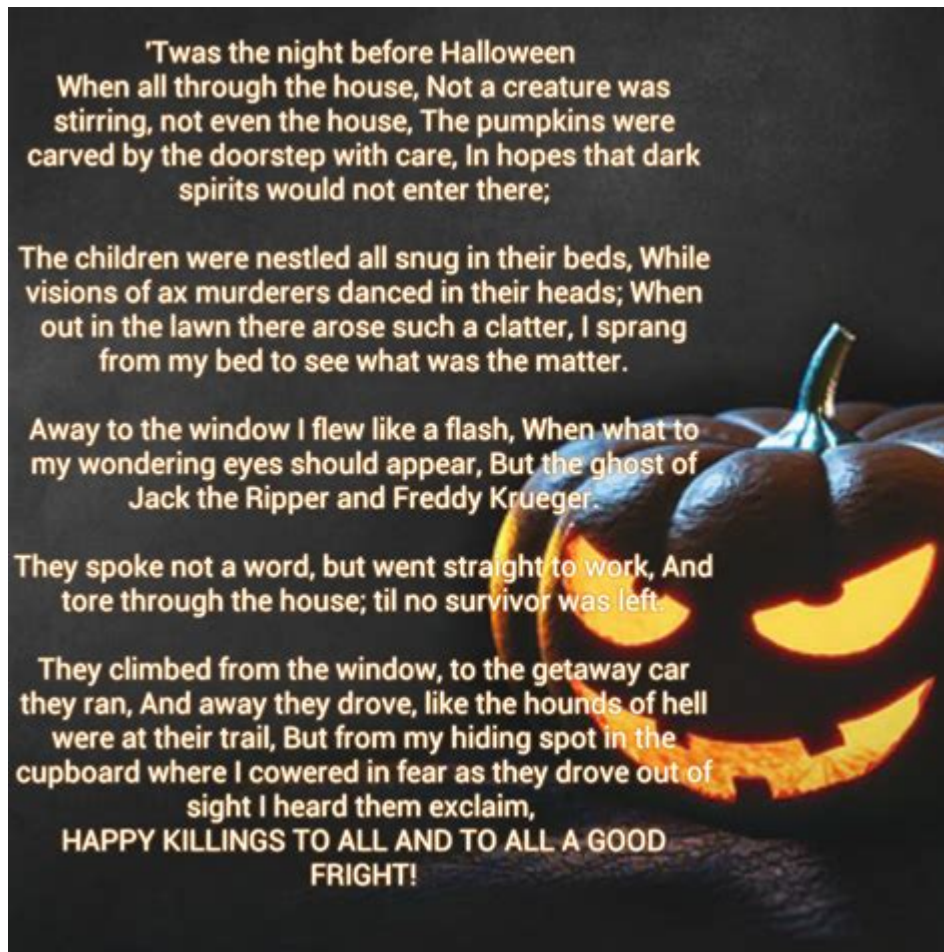


Twass The Night Before Halloween
