

What Your First Grader Needs To Know

What your first grader needs to know...

Reading Skills

- Recognize upper- and lower-case letters
- Know, identify, and pronounce sight words (words that often are spelled differently than how they sound) and understand that analogous words by sight. (Control: sight words are "the", "of", "and", "is")
- Know the alphabet and basic features of letters and words
- Sound out words and be able to identify sounds and patterns to recognize and pronounce words
- Recognize words that are long and short
- Tell the difference between facts and fiction
- Recall sequence of events in a story (first, second, third, ending, etc.)

Writing Skills

- Write upper- and lower-case letters
- Write their name
- Use letters and shapes to direct and label objects
- Create simple words and sentences

Fine Motor Skills and Social Skills

- Hold a pencil, crayon, or marker correctly
- Hold scissors correctly
- Work independently for 10-15 minutes at a time
- Engage with others
- Use materials respectfully
- Use words to resolve conflicts
- Understand and follow simple directions

Mathematic Skills

- Understanding of numbers and time
- Write numbers 1-20
- Add and subtract numbers 1 through 10
- Know day of week and months of the year
- Use objects to create pictures to help solve addition and subtraction
- Count simple money (pennies, nickels, dimes and quarters)
- Know numbers 100-1000
- Recognize different patterns (in blue, red, and green) that students should know what colors are
- Recognize more shapes and more precisely knowledge of shapes (square, circle, sphere, etc.)
