WORDLY WISE 5

Don't confuse **AVERSE**, which means "unwilling," with **adverse**, which means "hostile; unfriendly." (She was *averse* to going on the trip because of the *adverse* weather conditions.)

When **SPAWN** is used in connection with fish, oysters, and other aquatic animals, it means "to produce and deposit sex cells; to produce young." *Spawn* also can be a disparaging or contemptuous term when it refers to producing excessively or in

large numbers. (Every year books are *spawned* by the millions.)

A **VIGILANTE** (with final "e," pronounced *vij-ə-LAN-ti*) is a member of a group formed to take the law into its own hands. *Vigilant* (pronounced *VIJ-ə-lənt*) is an adjective meaning "alert to danger; watchful." Note: the phonetic symbol *ə* indicates the vowel sound equivalent to *a* in *ago*; it is called a *schwa*.
